# The People of the Deer Park Research Lab

This is an archiving of the many pictures of the people who worked and played at the Shell Deer Park Research Lab. It covers about 30 years with many individuals and pictures. Many people have contributed pictures and stories for this archiving. The incentive to assemble this started with a series of pictures that Bob Johnston gave us, when they were clearing out the files of the Shell Historical Museum. From other individuals, such as Clovis Davis, Bob Olson, Tony Gatti, Delma Walters and Gary Welch, photos of the Deer Park people have been obtained. The biggest problem with the pictures has been identifying the individuals and the time when the pictures were obtained. I have had many people helping with this project: Lee Scott, Glen McCullough, Larry Maas, Burt Arnold, Clovis and Lois Davis, Charlie T. Adams, Mac Nager, Henry Kretzschmar, Janine and Roy Levitch, Bruce Winquist, Paul Conn, Tony Gatti, Stan Brandenberger. My thanks to all of them for their patience and help in sorting out individuals and dates. We haven't been able to identify all the individuals. And it is quite possible we have misidentified some of the people. I have tried to keep the writing to a minimum.


The Deer Park Research Lab was opened sometime in the 1930's. The refinery itself first had oil flow in 1929. The earliest picture we have of the lab is in 1946. At that time they were just adding the south wing to the old lab. Clovis Davis is the only one I know who saw the lab as in this picture. They were just completing the south wing when he hired in. Harold Kemmerer was director at the time but shortly thereafter Cliff Hogge became director. He was replaced by Bill Bailey in 1952. Bill, more than any other person, set the tone for the lab and was really instrumental in establishing a fantastic esprit de corps. He encouraged a strong friendly relation with the staff by encouraging and actively participating in many social functions. Most of the pictures you see here are related to these social events. On the next page is a picture of our leader, Bill, and wife Carma at one of the many dances we had.


This is the first picture we had of Bill and Carma at a dance; it was taken in about 1963. The earliest Christmas party I remember was in 1952. In the early years Kerry and Alice Arabian were some of the most active people in actually organizing the events. In 1952 though we had Lois Davis, Melba Limbach and John Wallin doing the organizing. Sparing no expense they brought in an outstanding corps de ballet for entertainment at the Christmas dance. After extensive rehearsals, with Lois Davis at the piano and Melba directing, a precision group performed the Can Can. It was obviously a well-trained group as one can see from the picture that everyone was in step. The odds were against the photographer of ever catching the group in step again.

I've forgotten when we finally got rid of the brown bag days. I think it was in about 1958. And I thought wrong! The law wasn't repealed until 1972

Not sure exactly where this picture was taken. We had originally thought it was taken in 1952 but Stan Brandenberger pointed out that Steve didn't arrive until ' 57 or later. But it is a strange picture. 4 or 5 guys standing around looking at Ray Coffey working. Not the normal situation!

In 1958 many of the Deer Parkers were in the new lab. Actually it opened in 1957, although some say they were in the new building in late 1956. The new building housed on the right a large meeting room and the library was on the second floor. The top floor on the left was devoted entirely to offices and the bottom floor was mostly computing and mass spectrometry.

Bill Bailey also had the old labs and offices in the old building upgraded. His goal was to make the facilities as nice as the new building for those of us who remained behind. We
certainly gained a lot more room, which was really needed.
We think the picture below was taken in about 1957. It was taken in the old lab after many had moved into the new building.

In 1962 many of us had the "opportunity" to run plants in the refinery. The union went on strike and over half the lab was out running plants. The first month was interesting but after that, in a word "BORING". Unfortunately it lasted 353 days. Clovis tells me there was a secret plan for people to enter the refinery site if union strikers blocked the entrance. The plan, call the "Rum Runners", was for people to meet at Clovis' and they would be transported to the north side of the ship channel and
 go by boat to the back side of the Shell refinery. Put Hinds was put in charge of the operation; he would have loved the intrigue. One morning Clovis had 10 people on his doorstep but, fortunately, the union strikers abandoned their strong stand and the threat dissipated.

This picture was taken in the period of ' $63-$ ' 65 as was the one below. They could well have been taken at the same Christmas dance. Certainly the picture with the Adams and Nagers was taken at the same dance as the ones on the following page. The background window in the bottom picture on this page is the same as in one of the pictures on the next page.

Back in 1970, these women were called secretaries, except for Esther who was the librarian. Now, however, they would be considered administrative assistants and rightly so! In 1970 we wrote our monthly and project reports by hand, so there was a very heavy typing load. And the scribbling and illegibility was bad at times I remember one time reviewing a report and I couldn't make out some words. I went to the author and asked him to clarify what it said. He couldn't do it either! No computers to do the work! But once everyone had a computer, their work consisted more of arranging appointments, schedules, meetings and conferences. A far cry from what they were doing 40 years ago.

While a lot of these general parties were being held, there were a number of informal gatherings associated with the lab. One of the best was the poker and domino parties held at Len Gallik's garage in Deer Park. It was quite convenient to the lab and people would gather there after work for poker and dominoes. Best of all, Len enjoyed cooking so we ate pretty well also. Some remember greasy sausage but I remember the finest venison I had ever had. I don't remember whether it was Bill Grisham or Bob Myers who supplied Len with a venison roast and Len cooked it to a " T ".

Nobody has been able to put an exact date on when Len started inviting us to use his garage but it was sometime after the ' $62-$ ' 63 strike. Everyone enjoyed the dominoes, poker and food.

Another activity that was enjoyed by many were the seemingly continuous domino games, championed by Henry Kretzschmar mostly. Henry organized many groups and at various venues over the years. I think he also was the chief scorekeeper and probably has records going way back. Henry put this history of the domino group together for our Deer Park Pictorial History.
"I found some domino records from my "archives" that date back to 1971. I think that is the year we started playing at lunch time in Annex D in Deer Park. The first players were Jim Crawford, Bill Reese, Bob Addison, Doug Cochran, Jerry Sullivan and I. In the back of Annex D we came up with a round robin of 10 games for three member teams using 6 players. We used a very sophisticated computer to determine the teams at that time, a piece of chalk and a blackboard. As time went by we would add players to fill in for people that would move, retire or just be absent for the day. We used an office in Annex D, whose office I don't remember, to play at lunch time. Then the game moved
to the new EPC building, where I was moved to since I kept the score of games and records each day. When we moved to Westhollow the game was played in M-2292 technician's office. Later it was moved to the M building Lunch room. The lunch time domino game lasted until the mid to late 1990's. A lot of us retired and the lunch time game ended.
"Dominoes have been played at various locations. We played in Leonard Gallik's garage. Usually on Fridays after work, eating sausage and BBQ with a few beers. A lot of trips were made to Jerry Sullivan's house on Toledo Bend reservoir. We also played dominoes at John Buffum's beach house on Bolívar. Our first domino trip out of state was to Herb Buchholz's cabin in Breckenridge, CO in 1986. The next year we went to Warren Armstrong's cabin in Truckee, CA. We have made this trip for 23 years.
"Here is a list of some of the people I remember that have played dominoes over the years: Henry Kretzschmar, Jim Crawford, Bill Reese, Bob Addison, Doug Cochran, Jerry Sullivan, Leo Taylor, Neil Babcock, Bill King, Raul Pena, Ken Kachel, Dick Young, John Buffum, Doyle Rains, Joel Paulk, James Johnson, Warren Armstrong, Mike Moore, Alan DelPaggio, Herb Buchholz, David Parker, David Singleton, Paul Conn, Dave Richardson, Charlie R. Adams, Skip Smith, Bo Davis, Mike Treybig, Peter Glockner, John Mahler, Glenn McCullough, Murray McAndrew, Ed Hawkins, Yosh Sakauye, John Miller. There may be more.

It is apparent that a very large number of Deer Parkers participated in the domino games. Gary Welch has made the comment that it looks as if all we did was drink beer and play dominoes.

Doc Baker retired as head of analytical in 1971, after working at the lab since its beginning, sometime in the ' 30 's. At that time 65 was the mandatory retirement age. Russ Hodgson took over as manager of analytical.

This picture, taken long after he retired, is one of the few we have found. I haven't found one of him when he was working at Deer Park.


Jim Ferry started in Deer Park in the early '50's. He worked in the pilot plants in Deer Park and later at Westhollow as a foreman. He died in 1987, three years after he retired.
